SPURN BIRD OBSERVATORY

Well autumn is well and truly here and we're looking forward to welcoming lots of migrant birds to our part of the Yorkshire coastline in the coming weeks!

The 7th Migration Festival over the weekend Sept 6th - 8th was another roaring success, with c. 340 attendees over the weekend enjoying the wide range of talks, guided walks, bird ringing and migration recording demonstrations, live art shows, music etc. all while being kept fed by our wonderful team of volunteer caterers! As always we're so grateful to all the volunteers and our official partners who help us pull such a great weekend together.

One exciting development for us this year is the addition of a receiver antenna in the Obs garden. This mast is one of many across Britain and Europe, which reads signals given out by birds or bats carrying radio tags as part of a global network by Motus Wildlife Tracking Systems. Any birds or bats tagged with these tiny radio transmitters which fly over the Spurn area will have the info from their tag downloaded through the receiver and sent to the mass database. We hope to learn a lot more about the movements of migrant birds in the area through it, and it is an exciting step forward for recording bird migration here at Spurn Bird Observatory. *Jonnie*
